HE government is rolling out a GH¢10billion package over three years as support for start-up businesses and youth entrepreneurship ventures

In line with this, the government, through the E-Levy, proposes to use GH¢1 billion each year to catalyse an ecosystem to create one million jobs.

In partnership with its development partners, the government will

raise another GH¢2 billion to support the same cause.

Local banks have also agreed on a package that will result in increasing their small and medium enterprises (SMEs) portfolio up to GH¢5 billion over the next

Interview

Speaking with the Daily Graphic on the sidelines of a post-budget engagement with the leadership and Members of Parliament (MPs) in the Volta Regional capital, Ho, last Saturday, the Finance Minister said: "The government is making the most extensive attempt in its history at kickstarting the entrepreneurial state."

"Over the next three years, the government will commit up to GH¢1 billion annually for the YouStart initiative, while the development partners and financial institutions will complement government funding with close to GH¢2 billion and GH¢5 billion, respectively. This is a clarion call for a 'new deal'," he added.

Stakeholder engagement

This week, the Finance Minister is continuing with the stakeholder engagements and will meet with the National Union of Ghana Students to discuss further details of the rollout.

The two-day workshop in Ho facilitated extensive dialogue among MPs, the Ministry of Finance and other key stakeholders on the principles and critical issues of the 2022 budget.

In his presentation, Mr Ofori-Atta said the 2022 budget "dealt with the past and delivers opportunities in the present, while investing in the future in a responsible and interconnected manner".

In a lively presentation, emphasised: "The time has come for Ghana to

become an 'Entrepreneurial Nation'" @ a 2022 Budget

The 2022 Budget, on the theme: "Building a sustainable entrepreneurial nation: fiscal consolidation and job creation", emphasises a post-COVID-19 economic recovery agenda, centred on youth entrepreneurship.

Accordingly, the YouStart initiative was announced in the budget as the vehicle for supporting young entrepreneurs to gain access to capital, training, technical skills and mentoring to launch and operate their businesses.

The YouStart will be carried out through the Ghana Enterprises Agency (GEA), the National Entrepreneurship and Innovation Programme (NEIP) and partner financial institutions.

Domestic revenue mobilisation

According to the Finance Minister, the government's resolve was to depend less on borrowing and more on domestic revenue mobilisation.

That, he said, would materialise if "we all

support these revenue enhancing and expenditure rationalisation measures".

Mr Speaker, we are determined to reduce the debt burden and promote our debt sustainability as our path to building an entrepreneurial state and creating jobs, especially for the youth," the minister had urged Parliament when he presented the budget last Wednesday.

Potential in Volta Region

On the potential in the Volta Region, Mr Ofori-Atta described the vibrant ecosystem of entrepreneurs in the Volta Region as a mirror image of what the government sought to harness as it put in place efforts to support private sector development through the YouStart initiative.

He said he was impressed by the level of innovation at display by especially youth entrepreneurs at the ongoing Volta Trade Fair, which commenced last

He commended the Volta Regional Coordinating Council and

the Volta/Eastern/Oti Chapter of the Association of Ghana Industries (AGI), the organisers of the fair, for their proactive initiative in showcasing the capacity of ingenuity of Ghanaians.

"I have seen a lot of entrepreneurs doing things quietly from here, even with all the challenges. But it goes to the

heart of the matter of how to eliminate this youth unemployment issue which has become an intractable part of our landscape," Mr Ofori-Atta said.

He said his visit had emboldened him, the government and his ministry about the necessity and expediency of the E-Levy.

Lessons to be learnt

Mr Ofori-Atta also described the Volta Trade Fair as a fine example for other regional ministers to rely on to properly tackle the issue of entrepreneurship building and a sustainable entrepreneurial nation in finding solutions to the youth unemployment





Biden to hold Africa summit to boost cooperation

ABUJA (NIGERIA). NOVEMBER 21

S President Joe Biden plans to hold a summit with African leaders to show Washington's commitment to the continent, Secretary of State Antony Blinken has said.

Blinken made the announcement last Friday from the Nigerian capital of Abuja, his second stop on a threecountry tour of Africa that began in Nairobi, Kenya, and will end in Dakar, Senegal.

"President Biden intends to host the US-Africa Leaders Summit to drive the

kind of high-level diplomacy and engagement that can transform relationships and make effective cooperation possible," Blinken said.

Blinken, who is on his first visit to sub-Saharan Africa as Secretary of State and is the highest-ranking Biden administration official to visit the region, did not give a date for the summit.

However, last Friday, delivering a speech to the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS), Blinken vowed an overhaul of the US approach to Africa that would treat the continent as a "major geopolitical power" and that would boost development without the 'strings" often attached to such deals.

"Too often, international



infrastructure deals are opaque, coercive. They burden countries with unmanageable debt," he said. "They're environmentally destructive. They don't always benefit the people who actually live there." "We will do things differently."

While the US has increasingly focused on countering China's engagement with the continent, Blinken did not reference the superpower, which will hold a China-Africa cooperation summit later this month in Senegal. — ALJAZEERA

Sudan's military reinstates Hamdok

KHARTOUM (SUDAN), NOVEMBER 21

SUDAN'S ousted Prime Minister Abdalla Hamdok has been reinstated following last month's coup when he was put under house arrest.

He has appeared on TV to sign a new power-sharing agreement with coup leader Gen Abdel Fattah alBurhan amid continuing mass protests.

The civilian coalition that nominated Mr Hamdok as PM two years ago has refused to acknowledge any new deal. The pact had been struck with a gun to his head, a spokesperson told the BBC.

"The future of the country will be determined by the young people on

the ground," Siddiq Abu-Fawwaz, from the Forces for Freedom and Change (FFC) coalition, told BBC's News hour programme.

On the streets of the capital, the security forces have fired tear gas at protesters marching towards Khartoum's Presidential Palace, demanding the military's complete withdrawal from politics.

Since October 25 when the military declared a state emergency and dissolved the civilian leadership, at least 40 people have died in mass protests against the

Mr Hamdok was quoted by Reuters news agency as saying he had agreed to the deal to stop the violence: "Sudanese blood is precious, let us stop the bloodshed and direct the youth's energy into building and development."

It is not clear how much power the reinstated prime minister and his cabinet of technocrats will have.

The military has come under intense international and domestic pressure to restore the transition to democracy. — BBC

AST Saturday, we published a disheartening story which said more than three million children were reportedly engaged in child labour. Again, the report indicated that it was estimated that more than one out of every five children in Ghana (21.8 per cent) were involved in child labour.

Over the years, we have always found one reason or another, including cultural and traditional practices, to justify the issue of children engaged in one form of labour or another.

But, certainly, any such form of labour is a clear violation of the children's constitutional rights and a critical leakage to accelerated national development.

Due to economic hardships or lack of hands to support the home, we often find reasons to send our children to farms, the riverside and the streets to hawk or even engage in child prostitution, instead of going to school. Due to irresponsible parenting, some children are also forced to engage themselves in these negative trades to keep body and soul together.

Sadly, our Department of Children and Welfare units are unable to help because of logistical constraints. It is not the case that Ghana does not

have the laws or the legal framework

Child labour canker must be addressed

to protect children against child labour; its enforcement is the headache.

For instance, even though Section 96 of the Children's Act, 1998 (Act 560) mandates metropolitan, municipal and district assemblies (MMDAs) to enforce the laws on child labour, we wonder which of our MMDAs are able to enforce it. Again, although Section 88 of the Children's Act, 1998 (Act 560) prohibits night work and long hours of work for children, many children are caught in that web.

Indeed, it is the norm in some parts of the country for schoolchildren to be used as farm hands by teachers and also undertake household chores for them.

When we expose our children to these hazards, the consequences are always grave, not only for the families but also the country as a

For instance, the just ended Basic Education Certificate Examination (BECE) in the Wenchi municipality saw 14 pregnant candidates and 11 nursing mothers taking part. In the event that these unfortunate teenagers do not get the requisite support after delivery, it means their children will also be exposed to such hazards.

This is where the Daily Graphic would want to encourage all stakeholders, including nongovernmental organisations, to come on board to support and put our children at their rightful place to help reduce the poverty gap.

In the past, there were some NGOs and civil society organisations which had undertaken projects to support the education and vocational training of children in the cities and villages as a way of empowering them to be gainfully employed.

We believe that it is time we sat down as a country to review all the legal frameworks, identify the challenges in their implementation and come up with appropriate solutions to address the canker of child labour.

Fighting child labour issues should not be left with any one ministry or agency; we must all play a key role in addressing the problem. For instance, how come our MMDAs have never thought of it or come up with a programme or solution to address child labour issues in their respective jurisdictions?

We cannot and should not expect the central government to address the child labour menace alone when the MMDAs are on the ground to effectively deal with it.

The media will continue to bring these development challenges to the fore and we expect our duty bearers not to sweep the issues under the carpet.

The time to act is now before it is too late. We need to build our human capital for the effective management of our resources and also position our country to reap the dividends.

We will be losing the agenda if we allow so many of our children to engage in child labour activities, instead of educating to take over from where we will leave off.

Media, information literacy as public good

T has been both affirmed and denied that mass media has a substantial influence on people and cultures worldwide. It will perhaps be admitted that the mass media is an influential force in modern and modernising societies.

In Ghana and other developing nations in the sub-Saharan Africa, the influence of the mass media is conspicuous.

Media influence on audiences is likely to be more profound as Ghana's media landscape metamorphoses into a

hyper-choice system.

Media audiences' continuous exposure to media may lead to both positive and negative effects. Still adverse effects, such as the contamination of local cultures and the local media

sector's toppling are more common in

In addition, the local media ecosystem is witnessing a surge in misinformation, political polarisation and insidious hate speech.

Unfortunately, the National Media Commission (NMC) and allied media regulators cannot fully address the media's adverse impact on audiences.

Media, information literacy

More than ever, it has become critical to empower citizens to resist the adverse impact of media exposure through Media and Information Literacy (MIL).

MIL is a set of skills and competencies that enables people to use information and media effectively.

MIL is an essential requirement for active citizenship in today's knowledge society. Media and information literate people can access, analyse, reflect upon, use, create and share media content

MIL is related to the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs), particularly Goal 4 - quality education and 5 gender equality as it equips citizens with critical information, media and digital competencies for quality education, active citizenship, and peace-building.

It also helps citizens detect and combat stereotypes, hate and racial discrimination in the media (online and offline). MIL is, therefore, a public good that must be supported and promoted for the benefit of society.

Countries such as the United States of America (USA), the United Kingdom (UK), and Germany are increasingly integrating MIL into their educational curricular to ensure that children develop the competencies to decode media messages and use digital media early and effectively.The situation is different in Ghana.

Universities such as the Ghana Institute of Journalism (GIJ) and the University of Ghana and civil society organisations such as Penplusbytes, DW-Akademie and the Africa Centre for Media and Financial Literacy (ACMFL) have been actively promoting MIL.

However, there is still much more to be done to achieve MIL for all in Ghana.

Support for MIL in Ghana can take many forms.To begin with, both formal and non-formal educational institutions in Ghana must be encouraged to introduce aspects of MIL in their curriculum immediately and gradually

integrate MIL wholly into their

Parents and guardians must also take a keen interest in their children and wards' media habits; they must also support young people to use traditional and digital media wisely.

Further, media literacy scholars, experts and other people knowledgeable about media technologies must continue to educate the public to increase the media consciousness of the citizenry.

In addition, it is necessary to identify and support categories of people more susceptible to media influence, such as children, adolescents and illiterate citizens to develop their MIL competencies. Finally, the government can support MIL by improving access to information and media, including digital media.

The government can also build on the momentum of the Global Media and Information Literacy Week celebrated each year to mobilise stakeholders further to advance MIL as a public good in Ghana.



Biden,others urge restraint after murder teen acquitted

WISCONSIN (UNITED STATES),

HERE have been calls for calm in the US after a teenager who shot dead two people during racial unrest last year was cleared of all charges.

Kyle Rittenhouse, 18, argued he was acting in self-defence when he shot the men and injured a third in Wisconsin.

The verdict last Friday, which followed a high-profile trial that divided the US, sparked protests in some cities. But politicians, including President Joe Biden, and families of the victims have urged restraint.

"What we need right now is justice, not more violence," lawyers for the family of Gaige Grosskreutz, who was shot and injured by Mr Rittenhouse, said in a statement.

"I urge everyone to express their views peacefully, consistent with the rule of law," Mr Biden told reporters outside the White House.

Despite the calls for calm, a riot was declared by police in the city of Portland, Oregon, on Friday evening as some 200 people broke windows and threw objects.

There were also protests in Chicago and New York, but they were relatively low-key compared to the widespread civil unrest that the US had seen

Mr Rittenhouse said he was acting in self-defence when he fatally shot Joseph Rosenbaum, 36, and Anthony Huber, 26, and injured Mr Grosskreutz, 28, in August 2020 in the city of Kenosha, Wisconsin.

The teenager and the men he shot are all white. The incident happened during violent protests over the shooting of a black man, Jacob Blake, by a white police officer.

Jacob Blake's uncle was outside the court when Mr Rittenhouse was acquitted."We're going to continue to fight and we're going to continue to be peaceful. Let freedom ring," Justin Blake














PARIS (FRANCE), **NOVEMBER 21**

RANCE is sending police special forces to restore order in the French overseas territory of Guadeloupe hit by rioting and looting amid protests against COVID-19 protocols, French Interior Minister, Gerald Darmanin said.

"The first message is that the state will stand firm," Darmanin told reporters after holding a crisis meeting on the situation in the Caribbean archipelago with Overseas Territory Minister

Darmanin said France would send about 50 members of the GIGN and RAID elite tactical forces of the gendarmerie and police to the territory, where stores have been looted, shots fired at police, and 31 people were arrested overnight.

The extra forces will increase the number of police and gendarmes available in Guadeloupe to

Lecornu said Prime Minister Jean Castex would meet on Monday with Guadeloupe officials to discuss the situation.

Guadeloupe's prefect, Alexandre Rochatte, who represents the French government on the archipelago, last Friday had imposed a curfew from 6 p.m. to 5 a.m following five days of civil unrest during which barricades burned in the streets and firefighters and doctors walked out on strike.

In a bulletin on Twitter referring to vandalism, Rochatte later said that damage to electrical works near dams, especially by one in Capesterre-Belle-Eau, was causing outages to many customers, and warned it represented an electrocution risk.

Trade unions launched an indefinite strike on Monday to protest the compulsory vaccination of health workers against COVID-19 and health pass requirements. - REUTERS

EU, Britain talks on Northern Ireland progress

LONDON (UNITED KINGDOM), NOVEMBER 21

PROGRESS was made last Friday in talks between the European Union and Britain on post-Brexit trade issues affecting Northern Ireland and solutions can be found if London redoubles its efforts, the EU official in charge of the talks said last Sunday.

The two sides agreed last week to intensify efforts to resolve difficulties over trade between Great Britain and Northern Ireland, a British province that shares a land border with EU member, the Republic

"We had some progress last Friday," Maros Sefcovic, Vice-President of the European Commission, said during an interview with the BBC.

"I'm sure that if Lord Frost and the UK would double their efforts, we can resolve all the outstanding issues to the satisfaction of the people of Northern Ireland," he said, referring to the Chief British Negotiator, David Frost.

It is trite knowledge that some weight infractions are overlooked by some personnel for a pittance, which is heart wrecking, worrying, and must be addressed moving forward.

In relation to the latter, it is my contention that the human interface like the police must be removed from the equation for good reasons.

Rather gantry posts should be erected prior to approaching all such road infrastructure. Apart from these gantry posts being self-checking around the clock, it will address all challenges associated with the human interface and produce the maximum results.

On the encroaching of road reservation, I believe the GHA must have an introspection, and focus their attention

on their unit charged to protect such reservations.

Again, they must collaborate with the various Metropolitan, Municipal and District Assemblies (MMDAs), Town and Country Planning, Lands Commission, National Security, etc. to address this challenge.

I appeal to the GHA to dualise the road from the Tema Motorway to their weighbridge facility to avert situations where laden trucks destined for the facility get stuck on the motorway, posing risks and inconviniencing other road users anytime they break down.

Pharmacy Council, this is discriminatory, extortion

I WOULD like to bring to the attention of the government and the relevant authorities the illegality, extortion, unfairness and discrimination being perpetuated against Ghanaians trained outside who apply to write the professional qualifying examination by the Pharmacy Council.

The illegality lies in the fact that these foreign trained candidates who have returned to the country out of patriotism and have done their national service/internship in Ghana, are being asked to pay in dollars whereas their counterparts are being asked to pay in cedis.

Meanwhile, they are no more outside the country and the only legal tender in Ghana is the Ghana Cedi.

Foreign-trained pharmacists are paying \$800, equivalent to about GH\$4,800.00, while their counterparts are paying GH\$350.00.

That is about 14 times of what their colleagues are paying in local currency.

Similarly, when registering for the national service or internship, foreign trained pharmacists are asked to pay \$100 as against GH¢100 paid by their Ghanaian-trained counterparts.

What is surprising is that the Council's ad on the examinations makes reference to foreigners who were trained in Ghana and want to take part in the examination, but how then do they place Ghanaians trained outside in the same category of candidates?

The irony of the situation is that these foreign-trained pharmacists, out of patriotism, have returned to help build the country.

When they were doing their national service, they were paid the same amount in local currency as their Ghana-trained counterparts. They are all going to answer the same set of questions in the same English language and the scripts will be marked by the same examiners.

It is worth mentioning that most of these candidates were brilliant but needy students who were lucky to have Ghana Government scholarship to study outside.

They have come back with nothing but knowledge, thus to ask them to pay such cut-throat fees different from other Ghanaians is unacceptable.

The questions are: Have these young pharmacists been made less Ghanaian by the mere fact that they were trained outside? Or they are just being made cash cows. In any case, where do these monies go?

This attitude of the Pharmacy Council is in contravention of article 17(2) of the 1992 Constitution. It will also kill the patriotism in these young Ghanaians who brought back their expertise to be part of our collective efforts to develop the nation.

In view of this, as a citizen but not a spectator, I am calling on the government and the relevant authorities like (the Commission on Human Rights and Administrative Justice), the Audit Service, the Ghana Police Service and public interest groups, not only to stop this discrimination/extortion immediately, but also to let the Pharmacy Council account for every extra money extorted from Ghanaian "returnees" and refund same to the victims involved.

They should also be warned not to victimise these candidates.



He also served as a member of the Council of State when the country returned to constitutional rule in 1995.



The Daily Graphic therefore asks: "What further measures must the country take to enhance child health care?"

HE government's recent announcement to fund the treatment of four common childhood cancers is a significant step in reducing the financial distress of affected families.

Currently, most healthcare facilities and services in Ghana are built and purposed for adults, and only modified for child health care, after intense lobbying. Families travel long distances to access child health facilities, expertise and services in the few 'adults' tertiary facilities in the major cities. Many of such families are inhumanly detained for their inability to pay their healthcare costs. Usually the equipment, setup and expertise within these facilities are not childfriendly. Meanwhile, children are not miniature adults! They require specialised child health care and not a quarter or half an adult dose of care.

This current state of child health care requires specific governmental political leadership and funding to prioritise child health care from pregnancy to at least the first five formative years of life. Universal health care must include children, our future, and it must be absolutely free for the first five

Further efforts are needed to sustain successes chalked up in under-five mortality reduction from mainly vaccine-preventable diseases. We need to break the intergenerational transmission of malnutrition among children which is a recognised risk factor for non-communicable diseases (NCDs) including obesity, hypertension and diabetes in

Cumulatively, these NCDs are the commonest causes of adult hospitalisation and deaths while depleting our healthcare budgets. Investment in optimal child health care will thus save the country's future workforce, lives and finances.

CHILDREN are the future of every nation and, therefore, no stone must be left unturned to ensure that child health is given the right attention that he or she deserves. Children require focused care from highly trained/skilled professionals whenever they visit the hospital. Unfortunately, the number of children's hospitals in Ghana is woefully inadequate.

I, therefore, entreat the government as a matter of urgency, to take pragmatic steps to build more children's hospitals, at least one each in the coastal, middle and northern belts to increase access to specialised care. Additionally, there should be shared care centres in each district to ensure continuity of care after they are discharged from specialist care.

More health care professionals should be encouraged and sponsored to specialise in child care to augment those already in the system.

TO enhance child health care as a country, the government must ensure that there is at least one well-established and resourced paediatric and oncology unit or facility in every region for easy accessibility.

Using the efforts of government and nongovernmental organisations to mobilise funds for child health care, including cancers, should be encouraged and if possible, tax exemptions granted to those facilitating such efforts.

In addition, government and non-governmental institutions must also help create awareness among expectant mothers and every female of child-bearing age of childhood illnesses. Furthermore, adequate training of specialists or specialised paediatricians must be encouraged in the diagnosing and proper treatment of childhood

Regular in-service training for health professionals is key to the success of such a programme. This will ensure that health professionals are abreast of new developments in the health sector to help improve health care.

Although this initiative by President Nana Addo Dankwa Akufo-Addo is encouraging, more work needs to be done as a country to enhance child health care in Ghana.

Health authorities must focus on the preventive aspect of all childhood diseases, especially going through the various components of primary healthcare for children. Fortunately, the main causes of childhood mortality such as malaria, measles and diarrhoea are largely preventable and can be controlled.

In Ghana, close to one in every five children under five years is stunted while one in every 10 children under five years is underweight.

In achieving optimum child health care, the World Health Organisation (WHO) recommends among other things an approach called "the integrated Management of Childhood Illness (IMCI) strategy.

As a country, we must take the document seriously with the aim of reducing mortality and morbidity from the most common childhood disease as well as helping to promote their healthy growth and development.

Provide date for DTT transmission switch-off

Govt urged

HE Minority Leader, Mr Haruna Iddrisu, has urged the government to take immediate steps to announce a date for all analogue transmitters and frequencies in the country to be switched-over to the digital terrestrial television (DTT) transmission platform.

He said the switch-over from analogue to digital would support the efficient management of radio spectrum and promote content development, as well as expand development opportunities across the country.

Mr Iddrisu told the Daily Graphic in an interview that the delay in announcing the switch-over date was not helpful for the country's digitalisation drive.

Road Map

Mr Iddrisu, who is a former Minister of Communications, explained that the

decision to switch off analogue transmission was made at the Plenipotentiary Conference of the International Telecommunication Union (ITU) in 2006.

He said the consensus reached at the conference mandated member countries to undertake the process of migrating

from analogue to DTT transmission to ensure efficiency of radio frequency management, quality of transmission and the promotion of universal access to

However, he said, the government formally commenced the process to switchover in 2010 upon the receipt of a Cabinet approval on the outcome of multi-stakeholder consultations and the adoption of Ghana's roadman for the migration.

implementation committee, led by the Ministry of Communications was appointed to guide the entire

process and was expected to announce a switch-over date in 2016.

Mr Iddrisu said with initial financing challenges encountered from a publicprivate partnership (PPP) arrangement, the Ministry of Communications secured a cabinet approval to use revenue from spectrum auction by the National Communications Authority (NCA) to finance the development of state-of-theart transmission infrastructure nationwide and other activities, including the establishment of an independent management structure to oversee the operations of the digital

Former First Lady tells African writers

FORMER First Lady,
Nana Konadu AgyemanRawlings, has urged the
Pan-African Writers
Association (PAWA) to
help revive traditional
and cultural values among children
because it is "within their power" to do
so.

She said there was nothing wrong with good, old fashioned ways of bringing up a child, stating that it was important that the child grew up in a way that was acceptable to society.

The former First Lady stated this at her office in Accra last Tuesday when PAWA's General Secretary, Dr Wale Okediran, presented advanced copies of a book the association has authored in honour of her late husband, former President Jerry John Rawlings, to her.

Titled "J.J. Rawlings: Memories and Mementos", the book is a collection of poetry, short fiction, tributes and essays from contributors across the continent.

The book was edited by Professor Bill F. Ndi, a Cameroonian Professor of Modern Languages and Philosophy.

Mr Abdourahamane Diallo from Guinea, who is the current head of UNESCO in Ghana, wrote the foreword to the book.

What our children see

"We have to instill in our children a

certain traditional way even as we become modernised so that they do not move too far away from who we are as a people," Mrs Agyeman-Rawlings said.

"Who is in charge of what our children see and emulate? Education is a tool; your upbringing is your tradition and your life," she further stated.

Poor language

She thanked PAWA for the gesture and expressed concern about the low standards in the media in terms of the quality of language used by some practitioners.

She recalled how in the good old days radio and newspapers were a good source to learn how to speak and write the English language.

Tribute

Making the presentation, Dr Okediran said President Rawlings impacted writers across the continent and it was under his tenure that the continental association was established in 1989.

The book, he stated, was a tribute to how the departed former Ghanaian leader inspired many on the continent and beyond.

The PAWA General Secretary said the book was brought about by the outpouring of emotions by many African writers and commentators from all over Africa.

Dr Okediran explained that it was a collection of writings and poems from

15 countries.

His impact

The first daughter of the former President and Member of Parliament (MP) for Klottey Korle, Dr Zanetor Agyeman-Rawlings, who was also at the meeting, said it was always refreshing when something happened spontaneously, referring to the manner the book was developed.

"It is an opportunity for people to realise that JJ had a broader impact on the region (Africa) than many seem to realise. It is an opportunity for PAWA to speak about the role President Rawlings played in the organisation's inception.

"There is a whole generation who do not know some of these issues because some of his contemporaries have not publicly acknowledged the role he played in the establishment and expansion of other sectors such as the arts," Dr Agyeman-Rawlings said.

Launch

PAWA, which is an umbrella body of writers' associations, plans to launch the book in Accra in the middle of next month.

Also present at the meeting were Amina and Kimathi Agyeman-Rawlings, both children of the former President.

The PAWA delegation included Mr Louis Mensah, Reine Fioklou and Mr Oswald Okaitey, Media Consultant.





When shepherds become butchers: Leadership failure in Africa

HE need to express this opinion arose from gospel readings on Sunday, July 18,2021 in the Catholic Church.The first reading was from Jeremiah 23:1-6 on God's displeasure with the leaders of the Jewish community who were likened to shepherds.

As shepherds take care of the sheep, God expected the leaders also to take good care of the people over whom they exercised authority.

Jeremiah wrote, "Woe to the shepherds who mislead and scatter the flock of my pasture, says the LORD.

Therefore, thus says the LORD, the God of Israel, against the shepherds who shepherd my people: You have scattered my sheep and driven them away. You have not cared for them."

In contrast, in the Gospel reading, Mark 6: 30-34, we find Jesus proving to be a good, compassionate and caring Shepherd: "When he [Jesus] disembarked and saw the vast crowd, his heart was moved with pity for them, for they were like sheep without a shepherd; and he began to teach them many things."

Butchers

Because of COVID restrictions, I participated in the Mass virtually. The Priest, Fr. Michael Coutts in Toronto, Ontario, Canada, shared a personal

He had gone to the Holy Land as a tourist. He was on a bus with other tourists, and the tour guide explained to the group that the practice of shepherds there was to lead the sheep and the sheep would follow them.

A few minutes later, along the road, there was a man walking by the roadside, who followed a flock of sheep.

The tour guide asked the bus driver to stop. He confronted the man following the sheep that his practice had made him the tour guide to be a liar, as he had told the tourists that shepherds in that area lead the sheep, while in his case, he was following the

The man responded that it was true that the shepherds in that area led their sheep. In his case, he was following the sheep, because he was not a shepherd.

He was rather a butcher and was taking the sheep to be slaughtered.

Reflection

A reflection on this story and the two readings led me to think about our continent and how successive leaders have failed the citizenry.

Their primary concern has been to amass wealth at the expense of the people whom they are to lead. The practice of leaders amassing wealth at the expense of the wider population can be likened to the case of

butchering the sheep, instead of feeding and caring for them.

The failure of leadership has resulted in the deprivation of adequate resources for the majority of the population, to the extent that most people live under the poverty line.

The First Reading from Jeremiah spoke of the leaders who, instead of providing for the sheep, rather scattered them. We are aware of how so

many able-bodied young Africans risk their lives to cross the Sahara and the Mediterranean Sea to seek better lives. Are they not scattered by failure of leadership?

Through forced migration, they are scattered. We have created bottomless pits of national resources to cater for the insatiable taste for luxurious lifestyles of the small percentage of the elite in our countries, those who do not, in any meaningful way contribute to the economic development of the countries.

MPs

Members of Parliament (MPs), for example, receive salaries, cars, allowances, ex gratia and other

them pitiful salaries.

Farmers, especially the cocoa farmers, whose produce have over the years supported the economy, live in poverty-stricken environment.

There are cases where some leaders collect about GH¢10,000.00 a week from sitting allowances alone.

One sitting allowance alone may exceed the whole month's salary of some employees. Are we not

slaughtering these people?

We slaughter them by denying them their fair share of the national cake. The majority of the citizenry are slaughtered on the altar of abject poverty, deprivation of any decent living standards, lack of fresh water supply, unemployment, substandard living

conditions, etc.

Unfortunately, most people tend to think that failure of leadership is associated with the political leaders

Leadership, for purposes of social and economic development, is spread across all sectors of every country.

Within our own country Ghana, we can identify one particular institution, whose misguided policies can be likened to the shepherds who have not provided for the sheep, but have rather scattered them.

Sanitation workers not in frontline COVID-19 fight — Research

NEW research, conducted by WaterAid, an NGO, has found out that sanitation workers have been forgotten as frontline workers in the fight against the COVID-19 pandemic.

The research, carried out in South Asia, Burkina Faso and Nigeria, also found out that many of the sanitation workers in developing countries had been forgotten, underpaid, unprotected and left to fend for themselves during the COVID-19 period.

The NGO released the findings in their research ahead of this year's World Toilet Day, calling on government to improve the living conditions of sanitation workers as well as prioritising their safety and wellbeing.

In a statement issued on Friday, November 19, 2021, Water Aid said despite providing a vital service in ensuring that human waste was cleared, stored and disposed of safely, sanitation workers were often marginalised, stigmatised and shunned as a result of their job.

It added that many sanitation workers worked on the frontline of the pandemic, throughout national lockdowns, in hospitals and quarantine centres and in the heart of communities with poor access to safe

water, decent sanitation and good hygiene facilities.

Hazardous conditions

The research also highlighted the hazardous working conditions, a dangerous lack of PPE, poor training and legal protection, as well as loss of income for millions of people who work as sanitation workers. It's vital

The research considered sanitation workers to include people who clean toilets and sewers, empty latrine pits and septic tanks and operate pumping stations and treatment plants as well as those who clear faecal waste manually, sweep rubbish and transport faecal sludge.

According to the research, many sanitation workers indicated that they were forced to go to work during lockdown even if they felt ill, for fear of losing their

"In India, 23 per cent of sanitation workers interviewed had to work for longer hours during the pandemic, taking on an additional two to six hours per day while some hospital sanitation workers were even asked to work up to 30 hours continuously without

additional payment," it indicated.

Vital role

The Chief Executive of WaterAid,Tim Wainwright, said: "The COVID-19 pandemic has highlighted the vital role sanitation workers play in our communities - but it has also revealed the vulnerability of this essential workforce that is often undervalued and overlooked. It's unacceptable that so many sanitation workers operate without the support and safeguards they

For him, "WASH

services are critical to maintaining public health and will be fundamental to surviving and recovering from the pandemic, and future pandemics - but without sanitation workers, these services will not function. It's important we invest and support the workforce, not just for the sake of public health but also for the economy - to ensure universal access to decent sanitation and a better future for all."

For his part, Senior Policy Analyst at WaterAid, Dr Andrés Hueso González, noted that "It's vital governments, local authorities, employers and the general public take action to support sanitation workers so they can do their job safely, with the dignity and recognition they deserve.

In addition, he said: "These key workers should be protected through legislation, policies and guidelines that ensure workers have appropriate PPE, regular training, a decent wage and access to health insurance and social security."

For him, "Sanitation workers also need to be recognised, respected and supported by institutions and by individual citizens. We all have a role to play in tackling and removing the deeprooted discrimination they have endured for far too long."



Let's develop 'can do' mindset — Dr Kofi Amoah

A BUSINESSMAN, Dr Kofi Amoah, has called for a national blueprint that will help the citizens free themselves from a dependency mindset to one of "Can Do and Must Do."

"The present set of mindset and belief system of Ghanaians, affect our decisions in many critical areas, our sense of confidence, investments and borrowing decisions, choice of contractors, and all these and others collectively exert significant impact on our economic and social wellbeing," he said.

Addressing an event commemorate the 70th anniversary of Opoku Ware Senior High School (OWASS) in Kumasi, he said, "I wish to propose to dear citizens of the land for your kind consideration to embrace some of the key attitudes, beliefs and mindsets that have supported and enabled almost all of Ghana's colonial classmates in Asia -Singapore, Malaysia, South Korea, Taiwan, Thailand and the likes to escape poverty through their own sheer determination and have now

joined the developed nations of the

Dr Amoah, who is an old student of OWASS, spoke on the theme, "Reflections on significant global mindsets and their impact on Ghana and Africa: Prescriptions for Progress in the Era of an Emerging New World

Fast-tracking development

The businessman stated that the abundance of natural resource alone was not sufficient condition for fasttracking economic development.

He pointed out that a less resource-endowed nation with the proper mindset and determination for progress could outtake and zoom past a resource-rich nation with a negative mindset, lack of confidence, and over-dependent on imports.

The difference is mindset, orientation and belief system. The difference is each nation's blueprint,"

Dr Amoah noted that a nation whose citizens had no confidence in themselves or in each other but instead repose a great deal of their confidence and trust in outsiders



would struggle to succeed.

Loans

He stated that there was nothing wrong in taking a loan so long as the loan was used properly to drive economic development.

However, he said, "A greater percentage of the loan amount must be spent inside Ghana to create

positive impact of jobs availability for the youth of our society. This means that major contracts to undertake infrastructure and other projects in Ghana must be given to Ghanaian companies and consultants."

Harnessing talents

Dr Amoah has called for a national plan that will harness the talents of the youth for national development.

"The methods and programmes we adopt for preparing our youth will be the make or break, and we must embrace this with all the seriousness it deserves," he said.

He said the nation needed to be passionate and focused on youth development because "if we lose the youth of today, we have already lost our future".

Excellence

Dr Amoah also challenged schools to pursue excellence by equipping the youth with modern skills that would be competitive in the domestic and international markets.

"As a nation, we must strive for excellence as individual citizens and uphold excellence as a national goal and character.

"We have what it takes to be excellent in what we choose to do but we must expand it with zeal and massiveness for it to become embedded in our mindset, culture and everyday activities," he stated.

Changing world

Dr Amoah said the world was changing in all important areas, and Ghana and Africa could be sidelined.

"And as we manifest the desirable changes and improvements in our public and living spaces, the energising effects, the psychic benefits of orderliness and visible eye-candies will spur us on to make many more improvements in several other areas of life," he stated

• Essence of logic (7)



ODAY'S column on Logic is the 7th topic in the series on "Universal intellectual standards for critical thinking". After Clarity, Precision, Accuracy, Relevance, Breadth, and Depth, the concluding three will focus on Significance, Fairness, and Reflection. All that serve as preludes to a course I teach, namely, Thinking." "Creative and Critical

A stimulating book came out this year by one Adam Grant titled Think Again. Sub-titled The Power of Knowing What You Don't Know. The author agreed that everyone is entitled to their own opinions - when the

opinions are inside our own heads; but if we choose to express them out loud or act on them, it is "our responsibility to ground them in logic and facts."

In thinking through our own thoughts, it's amazing the likelihood of updating our minds when we recognise and invite the better cognitive angels in as guides.

Thoughts percolate the mind, heart, and hands — and control the action or inaction of the whole body itself, so logic as a tool in critical thinking is vastly important.

Whatever controls speech and behaviour needs guard rails to prevent the slump into disaster.

Logic best thinkers use

The logic the best thinkers use questions such as these: Does what I'm thinking make sense? Does what we are doing make sense?

Does what we are discussing align with the question to be addressed? Do the various pieces fit together in a functional way? Are we pushing round pecks into square holes?

How does the solution proposed

address the problem at hand? How does the inference follow from the evidence?

Critical thinking does not happen by itself; it has to be worked at each day as a habit. There's nothing more peevish than a

grown person, supposedly qualified for the job they do, look you in the eye and say, "That's how we've always done

Albert Einstein famously questioned the illogic [that is, the invalid or incorrect reasoning] in doing things the same way and expecting a different result.

That brings into question the need for the mindset to shift

from silly and parochial beliefs into the

Illogic, some US wars

In a recent conversation with some American educators, I noted the opportunity costs of the vast sums wasted in producing and exploding

The wars in the region of Vietnam, Cambodia and Laos killed between an estimated low of 1,450,000 people to a high of 3,600,000. It had cost US\$168 billion or US\$1 trillion today.

The war mongers did not learn from that costly experience and expected a different outcome in the war in Afghanistan and Iraq.

In the Afghan tragedy alone, Brown University researchers estimate that "more than \$500 billion in interest has already been paid (included in the \$2.26 trillion total sum), and they figure that by 2050 the cost of interest alone [on] Afghan war debt could reach \$6.5

When the explosive dusts settled, the wars had achieved no purpose and that brought to mind a quote from the civil rights icon Rev. Martin Luther King, Jr: "Rarely do we find men who willingly engage in hard, solid thinking. There is almost universal quest for easy answers and half-baked solutions. Nothing pains some people more than having to think."

Illogic in Ghana's food imports

In February 1964, Lee Kuan Yew of Singapore sounded the first alarm of the illogic of how Ghana's best and brightest brains were riveted behind desks copying Latin and Greek verbs and filling in the blanks.

In the process, agriculture - the nation's most visible endowment was abandoned to the hoe and cutlass drudgery of poor peasants.

Without competing on the world stage or meeting the growing local demand - in terms of large-scale rice,

corn, cotton, and other lucrative agricultural inputs - he questioned the misalignment. He saw the imperative for growing local agriindustries for value addition in Ghana

or the listing on the commodity exchanges in suitable markets.

According to Knoema, the import quantity of rice alone by Ghana increased from 24,000 tonnes from 1971 to 950,000 tonnes, and growing at an average annual rate 12.53 per cent, and exhausting Ghana's meagre

foreign exchange reserves.

Illogic of analogues in digital age

E.F. Schumpeter coined the term "creative destruction," a process in which the old ways of doing things are destroyed and replaced by more creative and productive means led by new technology, processes, equipment,

I remember the productive gains as a teacher when I purchased my first desktop computer in the 1980s. The first thing was to disuse the old typewriter in favour of the ubiquitous word processor.

It's disappointing to visit schools across Ghana today and find that even in the rare cases where there are computer labs, the computers are not made accessible to students.

In sum, we have analogue heads and teachers pretending to teach a digital generation.


Considering the logic for developing countries to leapfrog through technology, it's amazing how, in the year 2021, about 40 years or more since the introduction of word processors, a good many teachers are still stuck with handwritten (not even typed) Schemes of Learning/Weekly Forecasts, Lesson and teaching notes, etc.

Teacher training colleges need to support the new teachers with technology! And the teachers already in practice - in both the public and private schools - need to be helped to step up and engage with technology to help the youth to succeed.

Given the facts, the lack of critical thinking in key deliberations and decision making is illogical. It does not

UNESCO, Ghana – 75 years of partnership and development

Y 1942 in wartime, the governments of the European cou ntries meeting in the United Kingdom (UK) for the Conference of Allied Ministers of Education (CAME) conceived the idea for an international body that could spearhead the reconstruction of education and culture following their devastation by the Second World War. Following the proposal of the CAME, the United Nations (UN) conference for the establishment of an Educational and Cultural Organisation was convened in London on November 16,1945.

The conference gathered the representatives of 41 countries as the founding members of the new organisation that would



embody a genuine culture of peace through international cooperation and by mobilising the intellect ual and moral solidarity of humankind towards lasting peace for the peoples of the World, UNESCO was thus created and its constitution came into force on November 4,

UNESCO's broad mandate includes the development of educational tools to help people live as global citizens free of hate and intolerance, UNESCO works with its Member States to ensure that children have access to quality education. By promoting cultural heritage and the equal dignity of all cultures, UNESCO strengthens bonds among nations. UNESCO fosters scientific programmes and policies as platforms for development and cooperation. UNESCO stands up for freedom of expression, as a fundamental right and a key condition for democracy and development. Serving as a laboratory of ideas, UNESCO helps countries adopt international standards and manages programmes that foster the free flow of ideas and knowledge sharing.



MAS the duly authorized representatives of the Governments of Certain Powers and States, members of the United Mations, not at a conference which was held in London from 1st to 16th November, 1945 and determined that an International Organization to be known as UNESCO should be established;

whereas the Constitution for the said UNESCO was then formulated; and whereas it is expected that the Said Constitution should be accepted by the Government of Ghana;

NOW, therefore, these presents are to certify that the Government of Chana hereby accepts the Said Constitution of the UNESCO and undertakes faithfully to perform and carry out all the stipulations and provisions therein contained.

IN witness whereof this instrument of acceptance is signed and sealed by me.

Excellencies, UNESCO Director General,

NESCO is, arguably, the outstanding global agency to have emerged out of the formation of the United Nations (UN), and it is wholly appropriate that we have all come to Paris, from far and near, to celebrate this momentous milestone of its 75th anniversary.

Ghana was not there at that seminal ceremony in London, as we were entering, at the time, the active phase of our struggle for freedom from British colonial rule. But twelve (12) years later, in 1958, a year after our independence, we took our rightful place as a member of UNESCO. It has since been sixty-three years of fruitful, cordial cooperation, and the benefits are evident.

Just as we were the first country, south of the Sahara, to gain our independence, Ghana's distinguished diplomat, Patrick Seddoh, was the first African to be elected chairperson of the Executive Board of UNESCO in 1983. We were also the first African country to have a female representative on the Executive Board, in the person of another distinguished diplomat, Mrs Therése Striggner-Scott. I say this to demonstrate how proud we are of our membership of UNESCO.

From the training of science teachers for our schools in 1965, UNESCO has helped shape many policies in our educational sector, including the recent National Teacher Policy, the Science, Technology and Innovation Policy, and the mainstreaming of biosphere conservation plans in our national development agenda.

At the time when there was only one media house in Ghana, needless to say state-owned, UNESCO helped establish private, independent newspapers and radio stations, contributing to the making of a vibrant and free media, the envy, today, of many on the continent, and, indeed in the world.

With Ghana serving as the unfortunate location for 75 per cent of the slave dungeons built on the West coast of Africa to facilitate the barbaric, inhumane Trans-Atlantic Slave Trade, we have been able to preserve significant numbers of these World Heritage sites with the assistance of UNESCO.

In contemporary times, UNESCO has been able to redefine and reposition itself to address the pressing needs of the world. When the pandemic of COVID-19 struck, it assisted several countries, including Ghana, to help ensure that the education of hundreds of thousands of children was not truncated.

Just as UNESCO believes that education is a human right for all throughout life, so do we in Ghana. Through the Free Senior High School policy, we are committed to every Ghanaian child having access to a minimum of senior high school education. Tertiary education has also seen a major boost in infrastructural

development, with some 60 public tertiary institutions now able to accommodate our fast-expanding student population.

Excellencies, UNESCO's mandate has broadened considerably beyond what the founding members may have envisaged, but it is important that its niche is not compromised in the drive to embrace its ever-widening fields of competence. With this said, I commend the dynamic Director General's efforts at a strategic transformation of this organisation, and I ask that we lend her the necessary support.

UNESCO is its Member States, this anniversary is ours too. It has been 75 years of multilateral solidarity, and we must continue for the next 75 years to deepen our cooperation even further in the areas of education, natural sciences, social and human sciences, culture, communication and information to achieve the future we want, and leave no one behind.

Long Live UNESCO. Long live the United Nations.



As one of 205 such organisations across 199 countries, this is a unique feature of UNESCO within the UN family, that it has a national collaborating agency to ensure the smooth implementation of its programmes and also to harness the expertise from various countries for its fields of competence.

The United Nations Education, Scientific and Cultural Organisation (UNESCO) was instituted in 1945 after the second World War and headquartered in Paris, France. UNESCO's mission is to "build peace in the minds of humankind", a statement that reflects the ever-relevant thought that if we can collaborate in the fields of Education, Natural Science, Social and Human Science, Culture and also Communication and Information (UNESCO's areas of competence), we will realise our shared

UNESCO Ghana Commission has a Permanent Delegation?

The Permanent Delegations to UNESCO serve as a link between Member States' governments and the UNESCO Secretariat in Paris. The Permanent Delegation is the official government representation at UNESCO and is headed by Amb. Anna Bossman, Ghana's Ambassador to France.

The Ghana Commission for UNESCO (NATCOM) became an Associate Member of UNESCO in 1953, the Ghana Commission for UNESCO (Ghana NATCOM) was established as a Committee for UNESCO Affairs. The Commission acts as a formal interface between the Ghanaian government and UNESCO. It is hosted by the Ministry of Education.

CHAIRPERSON OF THE EXECUTIVE

The executive board's chairperson prepares the provisional agenda as well as the updated provisional agenda and guides the discussion and ensures that the rules of procedure are followed and that everyone has a chance to speak.

GENERAL CONFERENCE

UNESCO's policy and principal fields of operation are determined by the General Conference. Its job is to decide on UNESCO's programmes and funding. It also elects the members of the Executive Board and appoints the Director-General every four years. Each country has one vote, regardless of its size or level of contribution to the budget.

UNESCO Category II centres

Category II institutes and centres under the auspices of UNESCO are a global network of institutions of excellence in the organisation's domains of competence. Given their expertise, these institutes and centres contribute to the implementation of UNESCO's strategic priorities, programmes and global

development agendas, through international and regional cooperation, research, knowledge production, policy advice and capacity development.

Ghana boasts now of three of such centres. Ghana boasts now of three of such centres.

African Institute for Mathematical Sciences (AIMS)-GHANA

Institute African Mathematical Sciences (AIMS) is a pan-African network of Centres of Excellence for post-graduate training in mathematical sciences. research and public engagement. Since AIMS Ghana's establishment as a UNESCO Category 2 Centre of Excellence in 2018, it has engaged in programmes and activities that contribute to implementing UNESCO's strategic framework and Ghana's policy on STEM education. The centre is established under the agreement to perform the following functions:

- Undertake Innovative training and capacity development mathematical sciences, including teacher training at all levels with an emphasis on an interdisciplinary approach.
- scientific Undertake 2. knowledge and dissemination through scientific outreach, including in schools, workshops, exhibitions, fairs, conferences and seminars relevant for UNESCO programmes.
 - Be a Pan-African Centre of

excellence mathematics education and research for talented African students, which is part of the NEI aimed at producing fertile ground for the next 'Einstein' to be an African woman or man.

The core programmes run at the centre include MSc Mathematical Sciences, MPhil Mathematical Sciences, Master's in Mathematical Sciences for Teachers, as well as doctoral training. AIMS Ghana also has a research centre which conducts research in Stochastics, Climate Sciences and Atmospheric physics, data science, algebra and quantum. It also promotes STEM education through its outreach programmes and activities such as the Girls in Mathematical Sciences Program aimed at harness female talents in secondary schools across Ghana. The institute also has a strong industry programme aimed at promoting partnerships with industries in and outside Ghana

The institute remains appreciative of the Government of Ghana and the Ghana Commission for UNESCO (NATCOM)'s support over the period, looking forward to chalking up more milestones.AIMS Ghana wishes UNESCO a grand 75th anniversary celebration and we say

On 16th June 2021, the Minister of Administration (IEPA) officially as a UNESCO Category II Centre of Excellence for the West African subregion at a ceremony held at the







University of Cape Coast (UCC) in

IEPA has been in existence for over 40 years at the University of Cape Coast with the mandate to build and strengthen capacity in educational planning and administration of experts and nonexperts and to inform educational formulation implementation through research.

In 2013, the IEPA began a process of application to become a UNESCO Category II Centre and after fulfilling all needed requirements, saw the official signing to legalise its mandate as a UNESCO Category II Institute in November 2020. Her Excellency Anna Bossman, Ghana's Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to France and and Portugal Permanent Representative of Ghana to UNESCO, signed the official agreement on behalf of the Government of Ghana while Mrs Audrey Azoulay, Director-General of UNESCO, did same for UNESCO in a

virtual signing ceremony which took place at the UNESCO office in Paris.

A year on, the IEPA has achieved the following:

- · Inaugurated the Governing Board to provide strategic direction to IEPA management to promote equitable and quality education in Ghana and the sub-region
- · Joined about fifteen (15) global UNESCO Category II Centres to dialogue and recommended a road map to achieve the UNESCO Medium-term Strategy for 2022-2029 (41/C/4) in achieving the United Nations Sustainable Development Goal (SDG) 4
- Developed modalities for partnership with West African states and has held stakeholder dialogues to drive this agenda
- · Assisting the Ministry of Education in Ghana to build an effective SDG 4 data production and monitoring system to inform policy interventions
 - Building capacity

educational administrators and leaders through MPhil and PhD Programmes as well professional development workshops in educational leadership, administration and planning

- Partnering the Ghana Education Service (GES) on educational delivery through consultancy, research and capacity building trainings.
- · Driving advocacy on SDG 4 through radio programmes and webinar series.

Instrumentally, the IEPA UNESCO Category II Centre of Excellence is building bridges for the achievement of SDG 4 in Ghana and the West African sub-region and is poised to use research in topical issues of educational equity to drive effectiveness to the educational priority areas of UNESCO.

Accra named UNESCO World Book Capital 2023

ACCRA has been named UNESCO World Book Capital for 2023. The city of Accra was selected for its strong focus on young people and their potential to contribute to the culture and wealth of Ghana. Accra's proposed programme seeks to use the power of books to engage these young people, as an effective way of skilling up the next generation.

Cities designated as UNESCO World Book Capital are to promote books and reading for all ages and population groups, within and across national borders, and to organise a programme of activities for the year.

The Ghana Book Development Council is spearheading this initiative together with the Accra Metropolitan Assembly.







Gender in Education

UNESCO has supported the Girls' Education Unit (GEU) of the Ghana Education Service (GES) to develop a Girls' Education Strategy, and enhanced the capacity of STEM Teachers in St Joseph's College of Education (Bechem), OLA College of Education (Cape Coast) and St Francis' College of Education (Hohoe), and organised biannual STEM clinics for JHS girls to pursue STEM-related subjects and careers and overcome stereotypes. UNESCO has also

strengthened the capacity of District Girls' Education Officers (DGEOs) in project development, resource mobilisation, communication, and report writing.

"My colleagues and I thought Science was difficult but when I attended the STEM clinic, I realised that Science was not difficult at all. It only requires regular studies and a good teacher........." Elizabeth, JHS student at Okadjakrom in the Jasikan District of Ghana.

Youth: A cross cutting priority

THE most ardent wish of young people is to participate as full and equal citizens in today's world.They perceive themselves as capable of assuming responsible and determining roles in society. They need only be given the opportunity and guidance in order to prove their ability. Historically, where significant social change has taken place, young people have been in the vanguard. The commission backs many youth-led projects.

Girls can code

"GIRLS Can Code"; the project aims at training teenagers between the ages of 11 and 14 from 10 schools across the regions of the country. It has been designed under UNESCO's Information for All Programme (IFAP) and is intended to bring equity and narrow the gap between men and women in the use of information and communications technologies (ICT).



World heritage sites

Asante Traditional Buildings

THE Asante Traditional Buildings are the material culture manifestations of the Great Asante Kingdom which reached its peak in the 18th Century.

These buildings were used by chiefs, priests and men of influence. The uniqueness of the building and its mural decorations caught the attention of early European travellers such as William Winniett and Thomas E. Bowdich. They described the buildings as structures "...that gives the streets of

Kumasi a peculiar aspect of cheerfulness...". In 1980, the only 10 surviving Asante Traditional Buildings were listed on the prestigious UNESCO World Heritage List as the last remaining testimony of the unique architectural style of the great Asante Kingdom. The 10 buildings which now serve as shrine houses are located at: Abirim, Asawase, Asenemaso, Bodwease, Ejisu Besease, Adarko Jachie, Edwenase, Kentinkrono, Patakro and Saaman all in the Ashanti Region.







The Forts and Castles

THE forts and castles are fortified trading posts founded between 1482 and 1786, and spanning approximately 500 km along the coast of Ghana between Keta in the east and Beyin in the west. They served as links in the trading routes established by the Portuguese in many areas of the world during their era of great maritime exploration.

The castles and forts were built and occupied at different times by traders from Portugal, Spain, Denmark, Sweden, Holland, Germany and Britain. They served the gold trade of European chartered companies. The buildings also played a significant part in the slave trade and therefore in the history of the Americas.

In 1979, the buildings were listed on the prestigious UNESCO World Heritage List as buildings that have not shaped only Ghana's history but that of the world over four centuries as the focus of first the gold trade and then the slave trade and that they are a significant and emotive symbol of European-African encounters and the starting point of the African Diaspora.





Mobile money to outstrip cheque transactions

CIB Ghana

N the first four months of 2021, the usage of mobile money in non-cash retail payments overtook the traditional cheque transactions in the country. A Bank of Ghana (BoG) report on

payment systems showed that while the volume of transactions on mobile money was GH¢301.1 billion, that of cheque transactions was GH¢68.3 billion between January and April this

The Chartered Institute of Bankers (CIB) Ghana said based on the growth trajectory, it was hopeful that the usage of mobile money in non-cash retail payments would surpass traditional cheques far more than the GH¢389 billion recorded for mobile money transactions in 2020.

However, it is not clear whether the trend of more consumers switching to the use of mobile money for transactional purposes will continue after the proposed 1.75 per cent levy on mobile money and other electronic transactions which takes effect next

But opening the 25th National Banking Conference of the CIB Ghana in Accra on November 18, the President of the institute, Right Rev. Patricia Sappor, observed that if the trend



continued, the total value of mobile money transactions would surpass cheque transactions by far.

On the theme: "The Digital Economy of Ghana; The Strategic Role of the Banking Industry," the conference provided a platform for an in-depth interrogation of topical issues in relation to the economy and the banking industry.





"I'm miserable. I feel fake, like a robot controlled by the enormousness of the business that I've created and the expectations that it entails. Everyone

thinks I'm a big success; I'm envied by friends, neighbours and family. My employees look at me with awe. I've created a culture of fear where no one dares to make a mistake. I've accustomed my family to such luxuries that I can't quit on my lavish lifestyle. And worst of all, I feel so alone."

I was taken aback. I was one of those who looked at John as if everything always worked out for him. It never crossed my mind that he could be so troubled. I didn't know what to say as the truth was that I hadn't known him very well.

Over the next few days and weeks,

his words and sullen face did not leave me. What he was going through echoed a lot of what I also went through 10 years ago.

It was apparent, like me before, that he had reached a place where his inner thoughts didn't match his outward actions.

His true self rebelled against his false self. Whether at work or at home, his leadership was one of reaction, resting on his street smarts, experience and screaming when things didn't go his way.

He had simply stood still over the

last 15 years and never developed himself or those around him.

Leadership

Whether in the business world or otherwise, leadership is about personal growth and raising one's

self-awareness. As much as we try to separate the leader from the person, the two are inseparable.

Leadership is not an external act, or a part-time job or something we just do. Whether we are entrepreneurs, engineers, writers or bankers, the leader and person are one. Leadership is who we are being. It is an expression of who we are; it is us in action.

We lead by virtue of who we are our life experiences, beliefs, values, personality traits, motives and true

External results such as revenue, profits, market share and peer recognition matter, but they should not be what we pursue.

It is being ourselves and not an imitation of what we think we should be or what

others want us to be.

Journey

"Leading from within" is not a destination but a journey of deep self-discovery, requiring both self-knowledge and self-awareness.

It is not stagnant, but rather constantly shifts and takes on new forms. We must continually be learning about ourselves, challenging old beliefs, facing our fears, and courageously reaching deep within ourselves to find out what makes our heart sing and our spirit soar.

It means reaching our true potential, living with a sense of purpose, guiding us to make a positive contribution to the world around us.

We all have a unique gift or talent, and we must find it and nurture it as it will give us the most incredible platform to become who we must be and serve humanity accordingly.

Our lives, thus, are not defined by circumstances, life events and others, but rather by our true inner essence and an authentic path to mastery.



No withholding tax on gold export from January 2022 — Minister

FFECTIVE January 1,2022, small-scale miners (SSM) will no more be required to pay three per cent withholding tax on gold at the point of export through the Precious Minerals Marketing Company (PMMC).

This follows the government's fiscal policy to scrap the three per cent withholding tax on processed gold and replace it with 1.5 per cent withholding tax on unprocessed gold.

The Minister of Lands and Natural Resources, Mr Samuel Abu Jinapor, who made this known, stated, "For the avoidance of doubt, there will be no tax collected at the point of export through the PMMC from small-scale miners," he stressed.

Mr Jinapor, who said this in a virtual address at the 7th Ghana Mining Industry Awards (GMIA) held in Accra last Friday, said the decision was arrived at after thorough stakeholders engagement on the merit of the three per cent withholding tax policy.

The Ghana Revenue Authority (GRA) implemented the three per cent withholding tax policy on the export of gold from the country in 2019.

However, the Ghana National
Association of Small-Scale Miners
(GNASSM) and some think tanks,
especially the African Centre for
Energy Policy (ACEP), called for the
three per cent to be scrapped because it
had led to the smuggling of gold out of
the country.

Following the concerns, the Ministry of Lands and Natural Resources began engagements with the Ministry of Finance on a possible scrap of the tax.

2022 Budget

When the Minister of Finance, Mr Ken Ofori-Atta, presented the 2022 Budget Statement and Economic Policy of the government to Parliament last Wednesday, he announced a review of the withholding tax policy on gold Mr Benito Owusu-Bio (2nd from left), a Deputy Minister of Lands and Natural Resources, presenting the Mining Company of the Year Award to Mr Alfred Baku (2nd from right), Executive Vice-President and Head of West Africa Operations for Goldfields

export.

In the budget statement, Mr Ofori-Atta mentioned a reduction by half, the withholding tax on the sale of unprocessed gold from three per cent to 1.5 per cent.

That was part of the fiscal policy measures the minister proposed for the consideration and approval of Parliament to underpin the 2022 budget and to support the fiscal consolidation and growth agenda of the government.

Describing the theme of the 7th GMIA: "Positioning Ghana as a mine support service hub in West Africa" as apt, Mr Jinapor reiterated the government's commitment to remove bottlenecks in the gold value chain to create an enabling environment for responsible mining in the country.

He said the theme for the event was in line with the government's broad vision to make Ghana the mining hub of Africa "where all mine and mine-related activities, from exploration to refining, from research to innovation, will thrive."

He said the government's focus was to build a competitive mining value chain in the country and make the industry beneficial to the local economy by promoting local content participation.

The minister observed that the best way forward to achieving that objective was for strong collaboration among the stakeholders in the mining industry.

GCM commended

Mr Jinapor commended the GCM for the strong leadership it had provided for players in the mining industry and the partnership the chamber had fostered with mining sector agencies to promote the

industry. He said through the GCM's partnership with the Ministry of Lands and Natural Resources and the Ghana Police Service, security had been beefed up at all mining sites.

Again, he said the partnership had resulted in the setting up of a taskforce comprising mining sector regulators and security persons to protect the mining companies and respond swiftly to challenges they might

encounter.



The Minister of Lands and Natural Resources has given an assurance that the three per cent withholding tax on processed gold will cease to operate beginning January 1, 2022.

Responsible mining

For his part, the President of the GCM, Mr Eric Asubonteng, said the chamber was focused on providing leadership for mining companies to mine responsibly so as to help build a sustainable economy.

He also said the chamber would deepen collaboration with state regulatory agencies and support the government's agenda to build a robust mining industry in Ghana.

Mr Asubonteng said the mining industry accounted for 49.4 per cent of the country's gross merchandise in 2020, which was an

indication that the sector played significant role in the stability of the economy.

However, he observed that the mining industry in the country still had a long way to go to fully realise its potential, which was why GCM had taken the initiative to help achieve that feat.

Given that safety was a crucial requirement for the success of mining companies, he said the GCM was guiding mining firms to adhere strictly to safety regimes with the vision to achieve zero harm at mine sites.





Betting centres need to be regulated NCCE boss

THE Chairperson of the National Commission for Civic Education (NCCE), Ms Josephine Nkrumah, has called for stringent regulation, supervision and monitoring of betting centres springing up across the country.

She said this would help to address the issue related to the increasing number of youngsters gradually becoming addicts because of the lack of effective supervision and monitoring.

She said the growing addiction of young people to betting and video games was becoming a complex issue which needed to be addressed at a national level by all stakeholders.

"All manner of betting centres dotted in every part of the country depict bad signals to us as a people, especially in a situation whereby the nation has allowed betting companies to operate without effective systems in place to regulate their activities," she said.

Betting centres

Sharing her views on indiscipline among the youth in recent times in an interview with the Daily Graphic, Ms Nkrumah explained that bad influences picked from the Internet, coupled with other social vices such as the involvement of young people in betting to make quick money, had desensitised them to the extent that "they think their wrong attitudes were the right way

of expressing themselves.

'On one of our of visits to basic schools during our Citizenship Week, a teacher complained about how some of the schoolchildren were prepared to go hungry and use their money for lunch to bet. Some even borrow to go and bet," she lamented.

Ms Nkrumah noted that children of the present generation did not think that hard work paid and always looked out for an easy way to make quick money.

"So while there are no controls on what these young people watch and do, the influences on them become more adverse".

The NCCE Boss said it was quite unfortunate that operators of betting centres had allowed youngsters in their tender ages nine, 10, 11 and 12 to engage in betting, although the law allowed for persons who were 18 years and above.

She said the situation was at all levels; from basic schools to tertiary institutions; "so every Ghanaian must speak to the issue for immediate solutions, else the money that we think we are getting as revenue will come back and bite us".

Content

Ms Nkrumah said another challenge the nation was facing was the fact that some contents on television screens and radio stations were not censored and made room for young

ones to pick some vices they saw thinking that what they had watched was real.

"How would two young boys kill another one?" she asked.

"I don't think parents will sit and watch their children go wayward. Unfortunately, some of these young people practice bad behaviours at the blind side of their parents so they always become aware when things have gone bad.

"The youth of today should let their conscience guide them in whatever they do for they are the future," she advised.

He also joined forces with an old mate from KNUST to establish a printing company known as Creative Dimensions.


In 2000, he enrolled at the University of Ghana, Legon, to pursue a Master of Arts degree in International Relations.



PwC calls for hard work to achieve 2022 Budget targets

• Vish Ashiagbor speaks ahead of major forum tomorrow

CCOUNTING and auditing firm PricewaterhouseCooper s (PwC) Ghana, has called for increased discipline and hard work from the government to help realise the targets set out in the 2022 Budget Statement and Economic Policy.

It said while the revenue and fiscal deficit targets, among other things, were impressive and ambitious, they were not enough to assuage the concerns of investors and the international community about the country's large deficit and high debt levels.

The financial advisory firm noted that strict implementation of the budget and the realisation of the targets were, therefore, needed to reassure investors that the country was capable of reducing the pace of debt accumulation and narrowing the deficit size, among other challenges.

The Senior Country Partner of PwC Ghana, Mr Vish Ashiagbor, told the Daily Graphic on Saturday that investors also looked forward to specifics on how the country hoped to narrow the deficit from the projected 12.1 per cent of gross domestic product (GDP) in 2021 to 7.4 per cent in 2022, as well as grow revenues by 44 per cent in a

For now, Mr Ashiagbor said investors were adopting a "wait and see approach" as more details on the government's plans that were unveiled in the 2022 Budget last Wednesday emerged.

Budget digest

The chartered accountant and Country Head of PwC Ghana was speaking to the paper ahead of the PwC 2022 Budget Digest scheduled for tomorrow in Accra.

The dialogue session on the budget is expected to provide the platform for key government officials to shed more light on next year's budget.

The annual event in partnership with the Graphic Business, the country's foremost business and financial newspaper, will also afford businesses and the citizens the opportunity to seek clarification on policy proposals in the budget with the view to making informed decisions ahead of its debate and possible approval by Parliament.

Mr Ashiagbor said the event would feature a presentation from PwC fleshing out the key issues in the budget and how they related to businesses and consumers, a keynote address from the Minister of Finance,

Mr Ken Ofori-Atta, and panel discussions by selected business groupings such as the UK-Ghana Chamber of Commerce.

He said the firm's Tax Leader, Madam Ayesha Bedwei Ibe, would also give insights into the tax policies proposed in the budget.

Expectations

The Senior Country Partner of PwC Ghana said the 2022 budget generally met his expectations

Mr Ashiagbor, however, said the choice of electronic transactions. including mobile money (MOMO) and the rate of 1.75 per cent on all sending transactions except for remittances were a bit surprising.

Tax net

He said while the E-Levy was a credible attempt to widen the tax net in response

to earlier calls, it also committed the crime of increasing the burden of existing taxpayers with additional levy.

He said there were also genuine concerns about the levy's potential to slowdown the pace of electronic transactions in the economy, noting that the scope and the rate of the tax needed further clarification.

Mr Ashiagbor said slapping the 1.75 per cent levy on all electronic transactions except for remittances, the government was raising the cost of business operation, especially in the area of payroll management, which relied on transfer of funds from an employer's account to those of employees.

He said when that happened businesses would now have to decide whether to absorb the cost for it to hit their profits or pass it on to consumers through prices.

He expressed the hope that the PwC 2022 Budget Digest would provide platform for the needed clarity and context on the tax, as well as the bases for the scope for the benefit of businesses and the citizens.

She said IIGh dealt in the kind of investment capital that intentionally strived towards building a more equitable and sustainable world, and it was willing to bridge

the capital gaps left by conventional investing.

"Let me put it beyond doubt that I will not accept any honours from Mr John Agyekum Kufuor or any of his cronies who have blatantly and cynically engaged in a systematic manipulation of the judicial

National Reconciliation

During the sittings of the National Reconciliation Commission in 2002, a retired Supreme Court judge, Mr Justice G. E. K. Aikins, had alleged that Capt. Tsikata had been implicated in the kidnapping and murder of three High Court judges and a retired Army officer on June 30, 1982 during the PNDC regime but was never tried.

Among the suspects were Capt. Tsikata and Sergeant Alolga Akata-Pore, both key members of the then PNDC.

Ghanaians brought Capt. Tsikata under scrutiny, but during the NRC hearing, he denied being involved in the killing of the judges.

There was insufficient evidence to buttress the allegation against Capt. Tsikata, according to the Attorney General.

One reason was that before the execution of the sole witness in the matter, he (witness) had withdrawn his accusation against Capt.

Joachim Amartey Kwei, one of the architects of the murderous incident, along with some soldiers — Tekpor, Dzandzu and Helki - were all found guilty of murder, sentenced to death and executed by firing squad.

One of the convicted, Amedeka, escaped prison and has not been seen since.

International exploits

Capt. Tsikata was appointed by the late Libyan Leader, Col Mummar al-Gaddafi, to a senior advisory position in charge of the Al Mathaba Central Committee, a support centre for the liberation movement and antiimperialist and anti-Zionist organisations.

Tsikata was also sent to the Congo, along with Major General Ankrah, as part of a Ghanaian military contingent, with orders from President Kwame Nkrumah to protect the Pan-Africanist and anti-neocolonialist Patrice Lumumba, who was the Prime Minister of that country.

Tsikata later went to Conakry, Guinea, to visit Nkrumah. He was arrested, detained and put on death row as a suspect of an assassination plot against Nkrumah on his arrival.

Samora Machel, a freedom fighter, intervened to pardon him. Samora travelled with him to Mozambique. He later arrived in Angola in 1964 to join the MPLA fighters and internationalist fighters from Cuba.

In 1995, the late Capt Tsikata was asked to join a negotiating team with Dr Mohammed Ibn Chambas, who was then the Deputy Foreign Minister, and Brigadier General Agyemfra, accompanied by Mr Harry Mouzillas from the Ghana News Agency as a journalist to cover the events.

They travelled to join Mr James Victor Gbeho, the then Chairman of the Economic Community of West African States (ECOWAS) and Resident Representative of Flt Lt Rawlings, and Mr Ate Allotey, a diplomat.

Captain Kojo Tsikata received one of Angola's highest honours, known as Carlos Silva among Angolan fighters, for his role in the struggle for national independence.

Tsikata is a holder of the Solidarity Award and of the Order of "Carlos Manuel de Céspedes", conferred by the Council of State of the Republic of Cuba.

Dogboe boxed more

By the fourth round, Diaz had some swelling around his eyes but continued to fire combinations and stiff jabs. Dogboe looked to box more and pick his spots to punch, which he did with a strong close to the sixth round when he caught Diaz with a combination along the ropes.

Dogboe (23-2,15 KOs),27, of Ghana, kept it going as he opened the seventh round with a flurry of punches that forced former world title challenger Diaz (26-4,16 KOs),26, of Puerto Rico, back and got the crowd excited.

Referee's warning

They traded three-punch combinations early in the ninth round and later in the round Dogboe was warned by referee Raul Caiz Jr. for lifting Diaz off the canvas when they were in a clinch.

In the 10th round they fought as though they both believed the outcome was in doubt and tried to close impressively.

Dogboe won his third fight in a row since losing his WBO 122-pound world title to Emanuel Navarrete by



unanimous decision in December 2018 and getting stopped by him in the 12th round of an immediate rematch in May 2019.

Diaz lost his second fight in a row.

On April 24, he was stopped by Navarrete, now the WBO featherweight titlist, in the 12th round of a title challenge.—Ring Magazine

Hearts need a miracle

As things stand now, embattled Coach Samuel Boadu and his men will need a miracle against JS Saoura in their backyard on Sunday to restore the smiles on the faces of their fans and push for a place in the money zone of the Confederation Cup.

After winning the maiden edition in 2004, Hearts look set to stage a comeback in the competition for the first time since 2015 when they were stopped by Tunisian side, AS Tunis, following a massive 4-0 defeat in the return leg after a 1-1 draw in Accra.


That notwithstanding, Hearts seem more experienced at this level than their Algerian counterparts who are

making their Confederation Cup debut despite crashing out in the early stages of the CAF Champions League twice. However, Hearts' poor run in the domestic league has raised questions about their ability to glitter against the Algerians who have won two games and drawn one out of four league matches played this season.

Pressure on players

Hearts must make this chance count

CHAMPION club Accra Hearts of Oak will be on the war path once again this Sunday when they play host to AS Saoura of Algeria in a CAF Confederation Cup playoff first leg at the Accra Stadium.

Sunday's encounter offers the Phobians a fine opportunity to make amends in their African campaign after suffering a humiliating 1-6 defeat to Wydad Athletic Club (WAC) of Morocco in their CAF Champions League second round tie last month.

While some pundits believe that the Champions League standard might perhaps be too high for Hearts following the manner in which WAC reduced them to an ordinary side with that memorable 6-1 spanking in Casablanca on October 24, 2012, the same cannot be said of the CAF Confederation Cup, which is less tasking.

It is on this basis that we want to encourage Hearts to pick up the pieces and go all out against AS Saoura with the aim of qualifying for the group stage of the Confederation Cup. Per the rules, whichever club wins on aggregate over the two-leg affair will be privileged to enter the money zone.

That, for us, should be enough motivation for the Hearts players to put the Champions League setback behind them and chase for the Confederation Cup glory. It is obvious that the Phobians have not been themselves since that heavy defeat they suffered at the hands of WAC, but the fact remains that the stakes are still too high for them to allow the past to hold them down.

Another motivating factor for the current generation is that Hearts are on record to have won the maiden edition of the Confederation Cup at the expense of arch rivals Asante Kotoko in 2004. Therefore, Coach Samuel Boadu and his men can draw inspiration from this impressive record to make a name for themselves this time around

However, whether they can make an impact in the competition or not largely depends on the outcome of the first leg in Accra on Sunday. To guarantee their qualification, it goes without saying that the Phobians need to score not less than two unanswered goals against their Algerian opponents at home. That is the only way to survive against North African opponents, especially when you play

home first.

Unlike Hearts, AS Saoura cannot be counted among the heavyweights in African football history. However, they can be described as an emerging force in Algerian football after finishing third in the Algerian Premier League last season.

Currently, they are seventh on the league table, with seven points from four matches, as against Hearts' three points out of the three games. This makes them two opponents with similar fortunes; hence, the need for Hearts to capitalise on their rich continental experience to outwit the Algerians.

Though Hearts have not been impressive as defending champions in the Ghana Premier League (GPL) this season, they have their destiny in their hands to make amends in their African campaign, which is a different terrain altogether, with better remuneration to boot.

Though fatigue might have slowed down Hearts' performance since they did not have the luxury of an off-season break due to the GPL and CAF schedules: that cannot be an excuse for them to disappoint their teeming fans and Ghanaians in general.

We believe the Phobians have what it takes to advance to the group stage by upstaging their Algerian opponents, albeit through the hard way. We urge Coach Boadu and his men to ride on the "Never Say Die" spirit to make themselves and the entire nation proud as the sole torch bearer in Africa.



We need a cleaner game

HE reported visit of Kurt Okraku and his Executive Committee members to the Police High Command is the latest piece of good news concerning the growth and development of our football. The purpose, we are told, is to seek cooperation and assistance from the security services in wiping out hooliganism, corruption and other ills that are associated with the game.

Nobody should teach us the negative

effects and harm that these could cause to our cherished game. As it happened through bad and corrupt officiating, we all appeared to look on when our team owners, together with our referees, ganged up and handled our matches to satisfy their pockets and won match points in the name of strategies in football.

We reached a point where team owners were able to select their own referees, accommodated them, led them and paid their own transport to and from match venues. It must be pointed out that it was not all referees who participated in this. We had referees at match venues who assisted home teams in this corrupt enterprise.

As if not satisfied with this crooked method, some team owners ganged up and supervised the selection of teams to win league championships and those to be relegated. That resulted in match-fixing which was before alien to our football

Naturally, it was not all players who supported this way of winning and throwing away match points.

I remember a referee confessing at a match review meeting that he was forced to award a very bad penalty to a team that was supposed to win a match because they could not score any goal on their own. And both teams were happy, except one of the players of the visiting teams.

The player reported the incident to the FA president who ordered for a second match report from one of the assistant referees. The report could not be used to change the scoreline but the referee was made to face a long-term ban.

Yet, there was another incident in which an assistant referee correctly raised his flag for an offside goal just 30 minutes to the end of the match. The home team's players who did not benefit from the assistant referee's action rushed on him and assaulted him for spoiling the fixed match. That assistant referee, although promoted to the class one grade, refused the promotion because he didn't want to handle Premier League matches. He remained a class one referee till he retired.

With regard to the assault of referees, the matter is in the hands of the match officials. First of all, they should ensure that security at their matches are adequate before they start the game.

Additionally, they should allow the law to deal with those who assault them instead of taking money from the teams whose fans assaulted them and they deny that they were assaulted. In other words, they should cooperate with the police. Period.

Three years ago, PSG entered into a partnership with Nike that would see them become the first football club to sport the Jumpman logo that is renowned with basketball legend Michael Jordan, selling the initial exclusive 40,000-item collection within a week.

A Nike spokesperson told BBC Sport the collaboration "marked two icons of sport and style partnering to fuel sports lifestyle culture", while Fabien Allegre, PSG's director of brand development, said it was "aimed at bridging sportswear and street fashion".

The club's mandate, Allegre told a Harvard Business School study, is to connect with cultures beyond football and spread the brand in different directions. He pointed towards partnerships with Justin Timberlake and rapper Travis Scott, and to LeBron James wearing the club's shirt before an NBA game.

When a fan wearing a Thiago Silva shirt, bucket hat and checked shorts combo was dragged up on stage to be celebrated during a 2019 performance by Dave the rapper at Glastonbury, it was confirmation the PSG brand was successfully seeping into youth culture

PSG's social media following has also rocketed, with Russell Stopford, chief digital officer, saying: "We are disrupting the world of football, on and off the pitch, in a uniquely Parisian style - that's the story we want to tell."

Club shirts have featured in designs at Paris Fashion Week, while players have appeared in promotional videos for Hollywood films. PSG even sold Rolling Stones-inspired merchandise when the band played in the city.

"It enabled us to reach fans who didn't necessarily follow PSG as a soccer club but who felt that wearing an item from the collection was cool from a lifestyle point of view," said Allegre.

In 2019 the club topped one million shirt sales and more than half of their Jordan collection went to customers outside France. They have since opened stores in Los Angeles and Tokyo.

The ambition is unquestionable but PSG are not without their critics, the club's spending on superstars such as Neymar, Kylian Mbappe and Lionel Messi has attracted accusations of both sportswashing and a disregard for Financial Fair Play, with La Liga chief Javier Tebas among the most vocal opponents.

Bellion has no issue with PSG. He jokes that Red Star are the Rolling Stones and Les Parisiens the Beatles but says the clubs respect each other's position in the city and the French football landscape. He is happy his own side have a "fantastic" story to tell

"My son likes to watch Kylian Mbappe and Neymar and it is normal - it is entertainment to watch a big game, but it is blockbuster in terms of all the marketing," he says

"We cannot compare ourselves to Paris St-Germain. What they do is fantastic for their own audience and the audience of Paris St-Germain is a blockbuster audience.

"Even if we had that kind of money we would not do that because we are more drawn into indie????? things, but we work with Foot Locker, we work with Vice. We don't see ourselves as snob people because we are deep into this kind of culture, that's just what we like, that is our vibe.

"We have a different way of thinking, a different way of communicating," he adds

STAYED up late to watch Isaac Dogboe win a close contest against Christopher Diaz and one thing caught my attention throughout the 10-round bout.

The majority decision victory represents one of Dogboe's biggest comeback statements against the reliable Diaz

Judging from the fight, it was

obvious the Ghanaian would have suffered another defeat if he had relied on only power against Diaz

Dogboe was skilful and combining it with his ferocious powers troubled the Puerto Rican throughout the entertaining bout.

The win makes it three consecutive wins since losing twice to Emanuel Navarrete in 2018 and 2019. I am impressed with the steadily comeback for Dogboe which is getting him closer to a world title shot.

After comeback wins over Chris Avalos, Adam Lopez and now Christopher Diaz, the 26-yearold's confidence is gradually returning since moving up in weight to featherweight.

He really needs that to turn around his career. He has improved his craft since moving to trainers Barry Hunter and Patrice Harris in his last three fights.

But is he ready for another world championship fight? That is yet to be tested but with the changes in him, I am hopeful he has what it takes to become a twotime world champion.

Possible opponents

Dogboe has the best of opportunity to challenge for the WBO featherweight title next but there is a problem.

Navarrete holds the title and the Ghanaian must challenge him to win that, a move that could be a stumbling block to Dogboe.

The Mexican is the only fighter to have defeated Dogboe in his professional career and a possible showdown for the third time could happen if the Ghanaian decides to go for the belt

Dogboe had stated previously that he would have a bright chance of avenging his two painful defeats to Navarrete at a favourable weight class such as featherweight but I

I believe Dogboe will struggle to beat the Mexican hard-hitting puncher who possesses height and reach



advantage.

There are other champions in the featherweight division that he can look forward to facing such as Leo Santa Cruz (WBA Super), Leigh Wood (WBA Regular), or Gary Russel Jr (WBC) with the IBF title vacant.

All these champions are tough but I think it makes sense to face them than a fighter Dogboe had lost twice to in the past.

I don't see the need for the fight and I believe Dogboe must continue working hard to enjoy his new beginning.

What next for Dogboe?

Inasmuch as I feel he is ready

for the world championship, Dogboe must not rush into it because it might be a dangerous situation

Where he is now, he doesn't need any more defeat to tarnish the kind of reputation he is building after a long wait.

He might choose to defend his NABF featherweight title once again to continue building him up for the world championship when he feels it is right to do so.

Until the right time, I am confident that by the time he decides to go in for the championship, he will put up a spectacular performance to win Ghana another title


Commey must fight Lomachenko courageously — Akai Nettey

can settle everything," he said in an exclusive interview with Graphic Sports in Accra last Thursday.





Adding his voice to the call to end walkover bouts, Nii Lante Vanderpuije said administrators of the sport must avoid selfishness to enable them get the best out of their boxers.

"We have to come together to fight what is destroying boxing in the country and it is upon all of us to ensure that.

"But I don't think anybody can best fight for the sanctity of boxing more than the boxers themselves and it is their duty to maintain the high standards of the sport," the former minister told Graphic Sports

Touching on how to make boxing great again in Ghana, Nii Lante Vanderpuije said the upcoming fighters in the country must be self-disciplined to be able to reach higher heights:

He charged Commey to condition himself very well for the bout and urged him to go for a knockout when the opportunity offered itself

'I think Richard should go for a knockout; if it gets to the 12 round, Lomachenko will take it," he stated.

Ataa Eddie wished Commey the best of luck and challenged him to make Ghana proud and give something for Ghanaians to celebrate with this Christmas

Meanwhile, the legendary ring official believes former world bantamweight champion, Isaac Dogboe, is too small for the featherweight division and has, therefore, advised him to move back to the bantamweight division.

He maintained that Dogboe, 27, (22-2-0) who fought Puerto Rico's Christopher Diaz in Las Vegas last Saturday, cannot carry his bantamweight punches to the featherweight, where he would need much heavier and powerful punches.

"At worst, Dogboe should be fighting at 126 pounds in the featherweight division, but I personally still think he is too small. The height and reach departments are crucial for him to

Govt institutes provident fund for Satellites

The government has instituted a provident fund scheme for the Black Satellites squad which won the 2021 Africa U-20 Cup in Mauritania last March.

This followed a directive by President Nana Addo Akufo-Addo in May this year that 50 per cent of their winning bonuses of \$10,000 each be invested in the GLICO Pension Fund on behalf of the 26 players.

This was disclosed last Thursday when the Minister of Youth and Sports, Mr Mustapha Ussif, presented a cheque for GH¢802,100 to GLICO on behalf of President Akufo-Addo. In an address at the ceremony, Mr Ussif said the ministry decided to adopt a policy to invest a percentage of the winning bonuses of all matches played by the national teams following troubling reports of players turning paupers after retirement

"In order to address this challenge, I had a discussion with the President, Nana Addo Dankwa Akufo-Addo, when the U-20 team became the African champions on how to present the presidential package," Mr Ussif revealed.

"The President directed that 50 per cent of the winning bonus should be invested in the GLICO Pension Fund for the team and come up with a policy to that effect. A draft policy was lodged at the Attorney-General's Department for advice. The Attorney-

General approved the policy and the agreement was signed on September 12, 2021".

He said after the initial investment, the players were at liberty to contribute

whatever they wished from future bonuses to the fund named; 'GLICO MASTER TRUST PROVIDENT FUND SCHEME'

The Greater Accra Football Association Chairman, Samuel Aboabire, expressed gratitude to the President and the ministry

for the initiative, assuring that the players would be encouraged to make personal contributions to the fund.

FORMER Accra Hearts of Oak midfielder, Lawrence Adjah Tetteh, is confident that nothing can stop Hearts of Oak from winning the CAF Confederation Cup.

The talented midfielder said Hearts had a track record as the first club to win the maiden edition of the CAF Confederation Cup in 2004 against arch rivals, Asante Kotoko, and could replicate that feat

Speaking to the Graphic Sports last Friday, Adjah-Tetteh was optimistic that the Accrabased club had what it took to take the continent by storm once again. He predicted that the rainbow club would qualify to the final and win the cup for the second time.

Incidentally, Adjah-Tetteh, whose equaliser in the 80th minute cancelled Charles Taylor's 51st minute opener to push the 2004 final into a penalty shootout, however cautioned Hearts players to approach the upcoming game against AS Saoura with a different strategy.

He explained that given what the North Africans are capable of doing, Hearts should score at least two goals in the first leg in Accra on Sunday to help them overcome any machinations that could be employed by the Algerians in the return leg.

"The strategy should be to prevent them from scoring and also make sure you score at least two goals because when you score them more than two goals and you go there, there will be pressure on them to make mistakes," Adjah-Tetteh advised

Adjah-Tetteh, who currently runs the Adjah-Tetteh (AT) Football Academy at Dansoman in Accra, also encouraged the players to believe in themselves because winning the Premier League and the FA Cup was no mean achievement which should serve as a motivation to them that they had what it took to conquer Africa.

Porter retires after defeat to Crawford


SHAWN Porter confirmed that he would retire from boxing in the wake of his defeat to Terence Crawford and his father's admission that he "didn't prepare like I wanted".

Porter was stopped for the first time in his career when Crawford floored him twice in the 10th round to successfully defend his WBO welterweight ch ampion ship

He later revealed that, regardless of the result, he had planned to end a boxing career that yielded two reigns as world welterweight champion.

Kenny Porter, his father and trainer, explained why he pulled his son out after the second knock-down: "Honestly? He didn't prepare like I wanted him to prepare so I didn't want him in that situation

"When guys get to certain levels they think they know what they are doing, and they don't take

Porter later said: "I understand my dad. I took too many clean shots which isn't the Porter

Dogboe inch closer to world title shot

After majority decision over Diaz

HANA'S Isaac Dogboe remains in contention for a featherweight world title shot after last Saturday night.

The former IBF 122-pound champion outpointed Christopher Diaz and won a debatable majority decision in a classic crossroads bout between boxers who have been beaten by the WBO featherweight champion, Emanuel Navarrete. Dogboe got off to a slow start but he picked up the pace and had some success during the second half of this 10-rounder on the Terence Crawford-Shawn Porter undercard.

Judge Eric Cheek scored the action even,

95-95, but judges Tim Cheatham (96-94) and Don Trella (97-93) scored in favour of Dogboe at Mandalay Bay Resort and Casino's Michelob ULTRA Arena

Puerto Rico's Diaz (26-4, 16 KOs) had hoped to revitalise his career by defeating Dogboe (23-2, 15 KOs) in his first fight since Navarrete stopped him in the 12th round of their fight for Navarrete's WBO featherweight title on April 24 in Kissimmee, Florida Navarrete previously defeated Dogboe twice in 122-pound championship matches.

Dogboe tried to press Diaz during the 10th round but he had trouble catching Diaz with flush punches. He landed a straight right in the final minute of the fight, though, and repeatedly threw hard shots at Dogboe's body.

Dogboe landed a counter left on the inside about 40 seconds into the ninth round.

A left hook by Diaz knocked Dogboe off

balance with just over 20 seconds to go in the eighth round

Approximately 10 seconds later, a clash of heads caused a brief break in the action and prompted Caiz to warn Dogboe for leading with his head.

Out of a southpaw stance, Dogboe landed a straight left that backed up Diaz about 1:20 into the seventh round.

Dogboe had a very strong sixth round after having difficulty catching Diaz with flush punches in the first five rounds.

Barely 30 seconds into the sixth round, Dogboe landed a right hand that caused Diaz to hold him. With just under two minutes remaining in the sixth round, Dogboe drilled Diaz with a thudding left to his body.

With about 40 seconds to go in the sixth

round, Dogboe landed another left to Diaz's body and followed with a right hand up top that made Diaz retreat.

Diaz snapped back Dogboe's head by landing a hard jab with just over a minute to go in the fifth round.

Diaz connected with a counter left hook toward the end of the fourth round. With just over a minute to go in the fourth round Dogboe snuck in a hard left to Diaz's body.

Diaz landed a right hand that made Dogboe move away from him with just over 20 seconds on the clock in the third round.

Diaz worked well off of his jab and avoided most of Dogboe's power punches during the opening round.

As things stand now, embattled Coach Samuel Boadu and his men will need a miracle against JS Saoura in their backyard

on Sunday to restore the smiles on the faces of their fans and push for a place in the money zone of the Confederation Cup.

After winning the maiden edition in 2004, Hearts look set to stage a comeback in the competition for the first time since 2015 when they were stopped by Tunisian side, AS Tunis, following a massive 40 defeat in the return leg after a 1-1 draw in Accra. That notwithstanding, Hearts seem more experienced at this level than their Algerian

counterparts who are making their Confederation Cup debut despite crashing out in the early stages of the CAF Champions League twice.

However, Hearts'



poor run in the domestic league has raised questions about their ability to glitter against the Algerians who have won two games and drawn one out of four league matches played this season. The situation has brought intense pressure

on the players and the technical team to find an antidote to their winless streak as they struggle to recover from the humiliating 6-1 drubbing by Moroccan side, Wydad Athletic Club, in the CAF Champions League last month. Hearts are also expected to use Sunday's game to exorcise their fear for North African teams, who have in recent times derailed their continental ambitions. As the Phobians seek to find their rhythm, Coach Boadu will have a difficult task motivating his charges to snatch their first win of the season to give their followers something to cheer about.

This is the first time the two teams are

meeting at this level, but the Ghanaians hope to put up a fine display to underline their status as a

continental giant

Sunday will also be a moment of redemption for the Ghanaians who must win at all cost, with players such as Ibrahim Salifu, Daniel Afriyie Barnieh, Kofi Kordzi, Fatawu Mohammed and Kwadwo Obeng Jnr. all eager to turn the situation around.

JS Saoura will likely approach this game with much confidence following their impressive form in the Algerian league this season, including a 6-0 mauling of RC Relizane on November 2.

Coach Moustapha Djallit will count on his hat-trick hero, Belaid Hamidi, to ensure an upset against Hearts

He will also parade other stars such as Mohamed Amine Ouis, Imadeddine Boubekeur and Mohamed Amine El Hammia to enhance their chances against the desperate Hearts side
